

The Fourth Law of Spirituality

“ye shall seek me, and find me, when ye shall search for me with all your heart.” (Jer 29:13)

This fourth law in accordance with the promise of Matthew 7:7 states, what you seek you will find. Those six simple words challenge us at the level of our personal motivation. This principle is found in many passages such as Deuteronomy 4:29; 1 Chronicles 28:9; Isaiah 55:6; Luke 11:9-10. The God-seekers shall always be amply rewarded by the God of heavens (Ps 24:3-6; Heb 11:6).

This rule meant that whatever righteous thing you seek in the spiritual realm, you can have it, if you want it badly enough. “Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they will be filled.” (Matt 5:6). If you want to, you can grow spiritually. If you have spiritual hunger, you can be mightily filled with divine oil and wine. When we seek His face, He shall perform His wonders and confirm the blessings of the covenant (Ps 105:4,5,8-11).

The promise and invitation of Proverbs 8:17 is true: “those that seek me early shall find me.” Tomorrow is not the day of diligent seeking. Seek Him today. Today is the day of salvation. The great mystic Thomas Kempis (who wrote the Imitation of Christ) said, “seek God, not happiness.” We have it all backwards. We seek happiness and hope to have God thrown in as a bonus. But we end up with neither. When we pursued our own agenda and earthly enjoyment and we wonder why life leaves us frustrated, disillusioned and barren. In the kingdom of God, everything good and blissful begins with a seeking heart! (Matt 6:33) When Christ is found in thy seeking heart, you will drink cheerfully from the fountain of joy.
